





BRIDGE Program Introduces Lynwood Elementary Students to Theater

arshall Elementary fifth-graders learned to perform on stage, remember lines and write plays during a multi-day theater program that will return to Lynwood schools this year.

Building Relationships and Inspiring Dialogue through Global Exchange, or BRIDGE, is designed to help students break from their comfort zones and learn to view their world in a different light.

Led by BRIDGE co-founders Joe Quintero and Adam Kalesperis, the program immerses children in the world of theater through a series of playwriting sessions to help them tell stories about their environments. The program culminates with a performance.

Quintero, who started his career on stage in New York and has appeared in numerous films and TV shows - including "Numbers," "NYPD Blue" and "Law & Order" - says the program is a way to open children to new perspectives.

"The main purpose of the program is to teach the children that no matter who we are or where we ome from, we are not that different from one other," aid Quintero. "Children all over the world face many of the same problems and this program bridges people together so they can learn from one another."

Kalesperis appeared in his first professional play at age 8 and has since appeared in "The Dark Knight" and "ER." The Chicago-born actor, who earned his Bachelor of Arts at UCLA, said he enjoys seeing the kids grow and develop throughout the program.



Elementary students' play to be performed in Africa

Fifteen Abbott Elementary School students in Lynwood USD became globally known this month for their playwriting talents when their story was performed in Rwanda about two neighboring families who decide to end their prejudiced ideologies and tear down a wall commissioned by the president.

The play, called "The Wall," is one of 76 productions created by Lynwood Unified's elementary and middle school students as part of the Building Relationships and Inspiring Dialogue through Global

Growing up on two continents, with family in Ecuador and New Jersey, Joe was raised in two culturally diverse environments. He learned at a very young age how to navigate different worlds by identifying common threads, and through his formative experiences was inspired to facilitate the exchange of ideas between different cultures.

Later on, while training as an actor in New York, during a performance for young playwrights Joe caught a gleam in the eyes of a 10 year old boy as he witnessed the impact his story had on the audience. That moment planted the seed that would eventually become B.R.I.D.G.E Theatre Project.

In his career as a professional actor, Joe appeared in film and TV, on stage in NYC and regional theatres across the country, and in several European tours, including Edinburgh Fringe Festival.

Joe's work as a teaching artist and educator with top arts nonprofits in New York and Los Angeles has equipped him with the knowledge and skills to lead his own thriving arts organization. With B.R.I.D.G.E, he has managed programs and facilitated professional development workshops locally and internationally, and has been a guest speaker for the California School News Radio, SoCal Drama Therapy Center, USC's Parkside Masters Series, and Emerging Arts Leaders/Los Angeles.

ADAM KALESPERIS

The importance of theatre and the arts in providing life skills and unlocking creative potential is something Adam experienced first-hand as a child. At the age of eight, he appeared in his first professional play, and he continued his involvement in the performing arts throughout school, later earning his B.A. in Theatre at UCLA with an emphasis in acting and playwriting. Professionally, Adam worked as an actor in regional theatres in Chicago and Los Angeles, in addition to film and television.

Since 2005, Adam has been working extensively in the nonprofit sector, serving in a variety of programming and administrative positions. As an arts educator and teaching artist, he has taught youth in foster care, correctional facilities, and underserved communities throughout Los Angeles County.

Recognizing a need to bridge cultural gaps between young people, in 2009 Adam collaborated with Joe Quintero to create B.R.I.D.G.E Theatre Project, using original, youth-written theatre as a means of connecting communities across the globe. Since its inception, B.R.I.D.G.E has initiated theatre exchange programs in four continents – traveling to Ecuador, Nepal, and Rwanda, while expanding domestic programming to reach over 500 students each year in elementary, middle and high schools. With B.R.I.D.G.E, Adam has produced over 100 original plays written and performed by young people all over the world.
